

## Judicial Immunity Tip Sheet

## <u>Q: Can I sue the federal or state court judge for money damages for unfairly deciding my case?</u>

A: No. Federal and state court judges have absolute immunity for judicial acts performed in their judicial capacities.

## <u>Q:</u> But what if the judge acted maliciously or made an error in deciding my case?

A: No. The judge is <u>still immune</u> from lawsuit, even if you allege that the judge

- Acted in bad faith;
- Acted maliciously;
- Made a mistake;
- Acted corruptly; *or*
- Acted in excess of his authority.

**Bonus tip**: Use the PACER computer terminal to read cases from this court on judicial immunity:

**Exception**: A judge is *not immune* from lawsuit in the following two limited cases:

- (1) For actions that the judge did *not* take in his judicial capacity; and
- (2) For judicial actions where the judge acted "in the complete absence of jurisdiction."
